Every dollar raised goes to Friends of Pink, which assists with medical, living and travel expenses (including house cleaning, lodging and more) for those facing breast cancer.


Statistics show that one in eight women will be diagnosed with breast cancer in her life. Since 2015, Tough Enough to Wear Pink (TETWP), the nonprofit that hosts Pink in the Rink, has granted \$160,000 to local individuals needing financial help during breast cancer treatment. That huge relief of monetary stress allows them to focus on kicking cancer's butt.

Heidi Sherratt became the executive director of TETWP in 2015, having previously been a volunteer for years. In the 1990s, she played on the notoriously wild and popular Crested Butte Red Ladies hockey team. "We were a really tight and strong hockey team with women in their early twenties to their early thirties." The team eventually disbanded, but back then they were the schnizzle of tough. "We traveled all over the state to play other teams. We were close-knit friends then and we still are." One

day, a core team player, Lisa Lynch, called Heidi to say she'd been diagnosed with breast cancer. Heidi had just been hired as TETWP's executive director. The dispersed Red Ladies were mustered once again to support their teammate. They came up with the idea of forming a women's hockey tournament to raise money through TETWP. "That's how Pink in the Rink was born," Heidi said with a proud smile. "We decided all the money raised would go to financial assistance for breast cancer patients."

The women range in ages and backgrounds. "The youngest player we've had was 12 and the oldest was in her late sixties." In the tournament, feisty mothers, daughters, aunts and sisters line up on the four competing teams.

In 2024, the Pink in the Rink tournament will take place January 26-28 – an entire weekend of competition, high spirits and fund-raising for a worthy cause. On Saturday, January 27, the muchanticipated Pretty in Pink '80s dance party will bring DJ Triple L (Laura Silva) spinning favorite pop and funk songs of the era, and yes, it's a fabulous '80s-themed costumed event. The hockey prelims, finals, championship and dance party all happen at the Jorgensen Ice Rink and Events Center in Gunnison.

Since 2015, the Pink in the Rink tournament has generated more than \$200,000, with \$40,000 raised last year alone. The organization hosts other events throughout the year, but Heidi considers this one special. "The community all up and down valley shows up to play and support the cause, and all the money raised stays in our community to help people going through cancer. It's an incredible weekend of bonding and laughter."
